SEAS Anniversary Celebration Sept 12<sup>th</sup>



As Jesus prepares his disciples to proclaim the Good News to the world, he reminds them to always remember that each human being is precious in God's sight. That truth should inform how we live today; how we do ministry and how we encounter every person we meet, including people we don't much like.

Despite the silly joke I'm about to tell you about church growth, Jesus was a wise and competent leader, as the passage of scripture we read today from the Gospel of Matthew shows. But here's the joke: Church growth must not matter much. After all, Jesus started out with 12 and ended with 11.

I told you it was silly.

The first part of the 10th chapter of Matthew, which we didn't read, shows Jesus gathering his original 12 disciples together and preparing them to go out and preach the Good News to the people he calls "the lost sheep of the house of Israel." At least for the moment, he asks the Twelve to ignore preaching to the Gentiles and Samaritans. Presumably, he'll get to them. As, of course, he and his followers do.

But what is the Good News he asks the Twelve to proclaim? Is it that Jesus has come to die for their sins? Or that if they declare that Jesus is their personal Lord and Savior they'll go directly to heaven, not needing to pass "Go" or collect \$200 on the way? Well, not exactly.

Rather, here's what Jesus calls the Good News: "The kingdom of heaven has come near." He is insisting, in other words, that people can live in God's kingdom today by being compassionate, loving, caring, just and merciful, which are the values that will reign supreme when that kingdom finally comes in full flower in the future.

#### One Brick at a Time

A wall stood in front of a man's bakery, a barrier that was 16 feet high and 30 feet long. One summer, for reasons known only to the man, he demolished it. Then he asked his 12-year-old son Will and his brother Harry to rebuild the wall — by hand. The boys were stunned. It seemed like a herculean task, bordering on the impossible. But they got to work. Every day, after school, they mixed concrete and laid brick upon brick. After a year and a half of work, they laid the final brick and stood back to examine the new wall. Their father came by and said to them, "Now, don't you ever tell me you can't do something." Then he walked back into his bakery. The boy named Will never forgot the lesson of that project. "I learned that you don't set out to build a wall," he said. "You don't start by saying 'I'm going to build the biggest, baddest wall that's ever been built.' You don't start there. You say, 'I'm going to lay this brick as perfectly as a brick can be laid.' If you do that every single day, soon you will have a wall." The boy grew up to be the successful actor we know as Will Smith.

### Does God Shortchange Some of Us?

We are used to hearing about people who don't believe in God. Their books fill the shelves at stores. They make the rounds on talk shows. They go out on the lecture circuit. They make the argument that the universe just happened, that death is final, that we give life whatever meaning it has. That's one issue. Some Sunday we can talk about that. Today we talk about another issue: How do we understand God's nature? What is God like? We always assume in the church that God is a good God. We think it's terrible to say anything bad about God. We may think only unbelievers attribute bad things to God. Nevertheless, even the people of God may have such thoughts. We know the psalmist wondered if God would forget him forever. And do I even need to mention the book of Job? Job practically screams at God, "Why don't you just leave me alone long enough to swallow my own spit?"2 Many of us admire C.S. Lewis, the great British scholar and prolific writer. For part of his adult life, he didn't believe in God at all. In part under the influence of J.R.R. Tolkien, he became a Christian. He wrote books that have fed our faith. We love his Narnia stories, some of which have even been made into films. Lewis had his own struggles with faith. We saw that in the movie of several years ago, Shadowlands. Somewhat late in life he fell in love and married an American poet, Joy David man. After only four short years, she died of cancer. Lewis struggled greatly with his faith. He recorded his thoughts in a diary and published them as A Grief Observed. He says in the book that he does not worry that he will go back to being an atheist. He knows he will continue to believe in God. He worries rather that he will believe terrible things about God: "Sooner or later I must face the question in plain language. What reason have we, except our own desperate wishes, to believe that God is, by any standard we can conceive, 'good'? Doesn't all the prima facie evidence suggest exactly the opposite?"3 Lewis writes very dark words about God in his grief diary, words that come from a committed Christian.
