

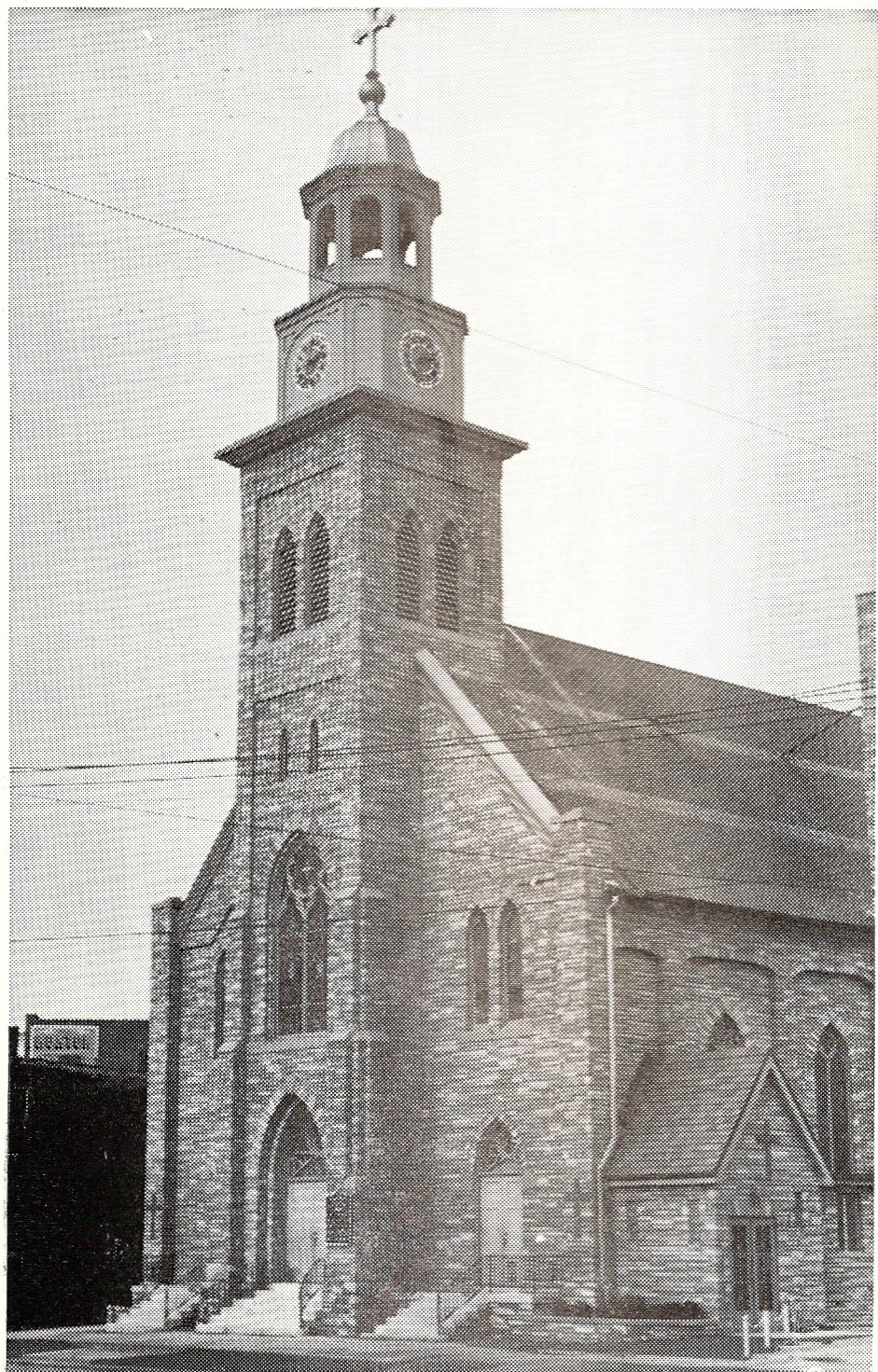

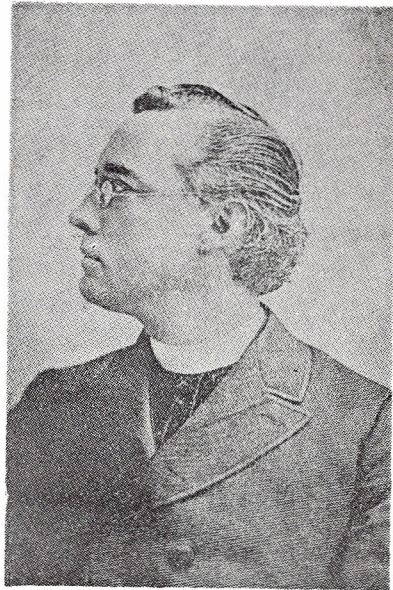

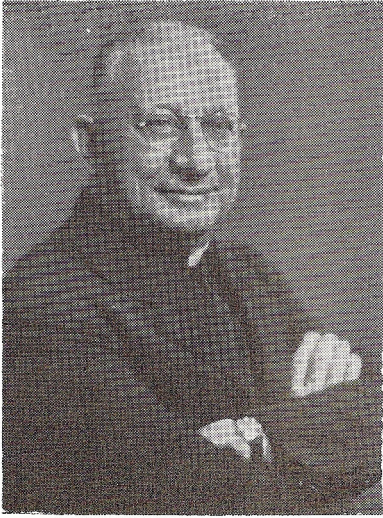

Our sincere gratefulness to the Sacred Heart of Jesus is expressed for all the graces and spiritual benefits of the past century, not only of our day, the days of our forebearers, but the entire Hundred Years.

A Brief History of Sacred Heart Parish

Previous to 1857, the few German Catholic families in Dunkirk worshipped at St. Mary's Church. On August 16, 1857, they met with Rev. James Nagel C.S.S.R. of Buffalo, who encouraged them to build a church of their own. A lot was purchased on Ruggles Street for \$300. and the erection of a frame church was begun at once. It was completed the following year and dedicated in honor of St. George on February 15, 1858, by Rev. W. Deiter of St. Louis Church, Buffalo. The size of the edifice was 70 feet long by 35 feet wide, and cost \$1,693.00.

The first trustees were George Dotterweich, F. A. Peter, Leonard Frey, John Buscher and George Uschold, and the membership consisted of about 37 families. Some of the other charter members of the parish were Andrew Dotterweich, Jacob Stahler, Joseph Scheyer, Vincent Bohn, Jacob Mehs, Frank Braun, Peter Hansen, etc.

The little parish was first attended from the Franciscan Monastery at Allegany, N. Y. by Rev. Dominic Geymer, who came here every two weeks. According to the records, the first baptism took place on February 20, 1858 and the child baptised was Barbara Guenther; the first marriage was that of Vincent Bohn and Dorothy Stahler on May 7, 1858; the first death recorded is that of Vitus Rau, February 28, 1858.

The next 16 years were rather unsettled. Father Geymer remained until 1859 and was relieved by Rev. J. N. Arent, who resided in Hamburg, N. Y. and he also came here every two weeks until November 1860, when he was replaced by Rev. Andrew Pfeifer, O.F.M. from Allegany, who continued until June 1862. In March, 1863, Rev. Luke Bandinelli, C.P. gave the first mission in the church and then the Passionist Fathers, who had charge of St. Mary's since 1860, also took charge of our parish with Rev. Frederick Lang, C.P. in attendance from February 1863 to December 1866.

In 1865, a schoolhouse was built at a cost of \$1200. The first teacher was Mr. Kerker. In 1873, the Sisters of St. Joseph were installed as teachers and the first were Srs. Aloysius and Genevieve. In the beginning there were 90 to 100 children in the winter and 70 to 80 in the summer.

Rev. Philip Birk, C.P. was the next pastor and officiated from 1866 until 1867. He introduced the payment of pew rent. Then came Rev. Henry Esler, C.P. from March 1867 until June 1869. On March 2, 1869, the congregation was legally incorporated, and as the matter was not properly understood, some difficulty arose, and in consequence, the church was closed from December 26, 1869 until the following May 8, 1870, when it was re-opened with a mission conducted by Rev. F. Stanislaus, C.P. He remained until September 1870, being succeeded by Rev. Daniel Rimmels, C.P. who was in charge until April 1874. He started a subscription for a new church in 1873, when he was replaced by Rev. Ignatius Sauer, C.P. After a few months, Father Rimmels, C.P. came back to take charge until July 1874, when the Passionist Fathers withdrew entirely from our parish affairs.

Jesuit Fathers from Buffalo came every Sunday until November 18, 1874 when Rev. Ferdinand Kolb was appointed the first resident pastor. Soon after his arrival, the question of building a new church was again strongly agitated. George Dotterweich bought a large house and lot on Railroad Avenue where the present school stands and deeded it to the congregation for a parochial residence. Up to that time, Father Kolb boarded at a private residence.

After a controversy as to whether to erect a frame or a brick church, it was finally decided to build of brick. Excavations were begun on April 23, 1876, the cornerstone blessed on June 11, 1876, and the church was completed and dedicated to the Sacred Heart of Jesus on November 18, 1877 by Rt. Rev. S. V. Ryan, Bishop of Buffalo.

The church is Gothic in style, 100 feet long and 52 feet wide and the tower was 130 feet high. The architect was Mr. Beebe of Buffalo, the mason work was done by Jacob Stahler,

the carpenter work by Frank Buscher and John Kunzler, the pews, pulpit and confessionals were built by Julius Mayer, the frescoing was done by G. Rosa of Pittsburgh. The 3 bells, weighing 2500, 1412 and 850 pounds respectively, were donated by the Dotterweich family at a cost of \$1750. The marble altar, costing \$5,000., communion railing, the organ and tower clock were all donated by George Dotterweich. As nearly all work on the church was done by day labor and every parishioner donating something, it is difficult to figure the cost, but \$20,000 is not putting it too high. The debt amounted to only \$5,000, certainly a good showing for the congregation.

The old church, school and parochial residence were sold and moved to East Second Street where the former is now a hotel and the latter, a dwelling. Excavations for a new brick school was underway when Father Kolb was appointed pastor of St. Boniface Church in Buffalo in May, 1884. He was succeeded by Rev. Andrew Frey, who completed the present school and rectory at a cost of about \$18,000. When the buildings were completed, there was a debt of \$12,000.

Rev. F. N. Sester, succeeded Father Frey in 1891. He took great pride in reducing the debt to \$7,500. and contributed at least \$2,000. to accomplish this result. He remained until September 1896, when he was succeeded by Rev. Joseph M. Thies. During his administration, the debt was liquidated in 1903, school money abolished in 1902, and improvements made, including new stained glass windows at a cost of \$15,000. The Groesch property on Ruggles Street was purchased in 1907, giving us a frontage of 120 feet.

At the time of our Golden Anniversary in 1908, there were 300 families in the parish and over 200 children in school, with five sisters in charge. The records show that in these 50 years, there were 2,300 baptisms, 412 marriages and 754 burials. A Pontifical High Mass with His Excellency, Rt. Rev. Charles Colton, as celebrant, was offered on Sunday, April 26.

Father Thies died on August 9, 1914 and he was succeeded by Rev. Henry Laudenbach, who served for two and one-half years before he was transferred to St. Louis Church in Buffalo.

During his tenure, the church was redecorated and the interior of the school remodeled.

Father Joseph C. Linsmeier came here in January 1917.

In 1920 a beautiful shrine of "The Miraculous Picture of Our Lady of Perpetual Help" was erected and dedicated by the Most Rev. William Turner, Bishop of Buffalo. Many favors have been granted through her intercession.

In 1927, the steeple of the church became unsafe and had to be replaced by a new tower at a cost of \$10,000. The church was also beautifully re-decorated by John Schober, a member of our parish. A new maple floor and linoleum were laid, new pews, new confessionals installed and the lighting system modernized.

In 1933, our 75th Anniversary was celebrated. A Solemn High Mass of Thanksgiving was offered on Sunday, Nov. 12th, with His Excellency, the Most Rev. William Turner in attendance.

After serving our parish for 25 years, Father Linsmeier was honored at a testimonial banquet attended by 400 of his parishoners at Holy Trinity Hall.

Our present pastor, Rev. Julius O. Noe was appointed administrator of our parish on March 1, 1941. Father Linsmeier continued as pastor until November 1945, when he retired after 28 years of service, taking up private residence in Buffalo where he died on August 29, 1946.

On June 2, 1946, Father Noe was appointed as our new pastor. Within 3 years, successful lawn festivals liquidated our debt, a new furnace was installed in the school and our church clock was modernized with new dials and electric mechanism. The interior of the church was redecorated in 1947, new side altars erected and major repairs made to the roof. The residence next to the school was purchased for \$5,500 also in 1947.

A building fund was started from the receipts of our lawn festivals and in 1949 the church basement was renovated into

a church hall for parish activities. A new gas furnace was installed and toilet and kitchen facilities provided.

Following this project, the remodeling of our school got underway, with a large new addition being erected and the playground blacktopped.

In 1950, our parishioners financed a "Holy Year" pilgrimage to Rome for Father Noe, and Rev. Rupert Langenstein C.P. took charge of the parish in his absence.

In 1956, the Rueckert property on Ruggles Street was purchased for \$6,000. Also in 1956, Father Noe celebrated the 25th Anniversary of his ordination. A Solemn High Mass of Thanksgiving was offered on Sunday, May 20th, with the new uniformed rank of the Knights of St. John making their first appearance. A testimonial banquet was held in his honor on the same day with 500 parishioners and friends in attendance. An auto was presented to Father Noe as a token of the esteem in which he is held by the members of our parish.

Our school was closed in June, 1957. St. Mary's School was made into a central grade school and re-named "Our Lady of the Lake School." Pupils from St. Mary's, Sacred Heart and Holy Trinity were in attendance. The experiment did not turn out satisfactorily, and our school was re-opened in September 1958 with 4 nuns and 3 lay teachers in charge. The registration was 184. The cost of maintaining our own school in addition to paying the yearly Mindszenty High School assessment and shortages, amounts to over \$1,000 per month. Since coming to Dunkirk, Father Noe's summer festivals realized about \$100,000., most of which was used for school purposes.

Late in 1957, preparations were made for our Centennial which is to be celebrated this year. A drive for funds was started and the original goal of \$65,000 was over-subscribed by about \$15,000. Major repairs and renovations are now about completed. The church was re-decorated and additions built to provide new confessionals, a baptistry, toilet facilities and a new side entrance from the parking lot. The rectory was entirely remodeled with new bathrooms, a completely new heating

system, etc. Both structures were then coated with Perma-Stone. The cost of the entire project was about \$82,000.

Our records show that there are now 475 families in our parish. There were 3,946 baptisms, 1,074 marriages, and 1,533 funerals during the past 100 years.

Such is some of the work accomplished in Sacred Heart Parish during the past century. It was made possible only through the blessing of God, the self-sacrifice of our good pastors, nuns and parishioners. May Sacred Heart Parish continue to grow and flourish in the knowledge and love of Christ our Lord in the years to come.

Ever since the founding of our Parish a Century ago, we have been very fortunate to have so many self-sacrificing Parishioners and Benefactors who made very generous contributions to our Church.

Every generation down through the years, accepted their responsibilities of maintaining and improving our Parish facilities.

To all of them, we owe our deep appreciation. We also feel that the responsibilities handed down to the present generation were accepted and fulfilled when our Centennial Fund Appeal was over-subscribed.

To all of those who helped make the Appeal a success, thus maintaining the tradition of generosity handed down to us by our forefathers, we extend our sincere gratitude.
